At Lackland AFB he maintains training aids, aircraft system mock ups, and trainer airframes; some so old and antiquated they no longer have technical data available...yet he manages to keep everything in good working order. Ralph is also the Engine Manager for all assigned aircraft engines,



regardless if installed on airframes or in the student labs. Upon being hired by Trailboss he also assumed the duties of Quality Control; a positioned he had never held before. As a testament to his meticulous attention to detail, when challenged with the 2014 Unit Compliance Inspection, every aspect of the Quality Control program was met "spot on" with zero errors!


Trailboss Awarded FOL-BOS Curação Contract!

And the list goes on.



Trailboss Safety Corner

Transportation Safety

City driving presents a different set of hazards compared to rural highway driving, especially when driving a large Bus or 15 passenger van. The high speeds of highway driving coupled with the potential for driver road trance and distractions are extremely dangerous. On the other hand, driving in the city calls for an increased focus on the rapidly changing driving behaviors of other drivers, as well as varying roadways, traffic signals and traffic patterns. Professional Commercial motor vehicle (CMV) drivers face many challenges during their daily schedule, so they practice the following precautions every time they get behind the wheel.

- Conduct a pre-trip inspection of the vehicle and cargo.
- Plan your trip route and check for road construction projects before leaving.
- Use safe driving techniques, including avoidance of in-cab distractions and loss of focus on the road.
- Maintain appropriate speed and space, keeping the three-second rule in good weather at speeds below 45 mph, and do not tailgate.
- Do not run yellow signal lights and always stop for red lights.
- Pay close attention when making turns to avoid other vehicles, pedestrians and cyclists in blind spots.
- Avoid backing whenever possible. Use a ground guide if you must back, and always check behind the vehicle for any obstacles.
- If your vehicle breaks down, turn on the emergency flashers and put on safety vest before deploying emergency warning triangles.
- Pay attention to railroad crossing signals, remembering to slow down, look and listen for trains.

By practicing common sense driving habits, Professional CMV drivers and their passengers reach their destinations safely.




Susan Houser (Administrative Assistant - Anchorage, AK)


Crossword Puzzle
